Your major bjectives this semester are to conduct the research project that you designed last semester, to analyze the data you collect, and to present your findings both in an oral presentation and in an APA-style paper. You will also be presenting at the Butler Undergraduate Research Conference.

## Grading

All assignments will be graded on a 0-100 scale. Final letter grade will be determined by the total number of points you have earned. Grades for presentations and the final paper will be negotiated between the advisor and second reader.

## **Assignment Descriptions**

**Practice presentation.** In the 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> weeks, students will practice the formal 10-12 minute PowerPoint conference presentations that they will eventually be giving to a wider audience. You will be allotted 15 minutes for your presentation. To allow time for questions after your presentation, you should limit your presentation to 10 minutes (12 minutes maximum). Since this is the first practice presentation, timing will not be strictly observed and additional time will be permitted for feedback.

**Final presentation.** In the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> weeks, students will give their formal presentations. Limit your presentation to 10 minutes (12 maximum) to allow time for questions. Conference Presentation and Abstract. On Saturday April 15, all students will present their research at the Mid-American Undergraduate Psychology Conference at the University of Southern Indiana. On March 1 students will submit their proposal for the conference. Students will provide a 250-words-or-less summary of their project. Your abstract should include a general statement about the topic or purpose of your study, a very brief description of your method (including the number of participants, if possible), a discussion of central expected findings, and a statement about the implications of your findings for research, theory, or practical application. The abstract should be self-contained, presuming *no* familiarity with your study. It should include everything your audience will need to understand what you have written.

**Progress.** Progress is demonstrated by working consistently (rather than waiting until the last minute) and by the quality of the rough drafts you submit.

**Attendance and participation.** Attendance and participation includes meeting at scheduled times with your advisor, being prepared for those meetings and contributing to the conversation, and <u>participating during the presentations by asking questions and/or providing feedback</u>. It is useful to get experience answering audience questions – please help out your classmates and be an active participant.

**Final research paper.** This is the culmination of your senior project. It should be formatted according to the 7<sup>th</sup> edition of the APA's *Publication Manual*. The grade for your paper reflects both the overall quality of your project and how well you have communicated about your project in writing.

The early weeks of this schedule may differ slightly by project. The tasks listed are some of what you should be doing, but may be adjusted based on other circumstances. For example, if you don't yet have IRB approval, you shouldn't be posting the sign-up sheet during Week 2. However, you can still be doing everything else to be preparing your study to run (including creating sign-up sheets).
